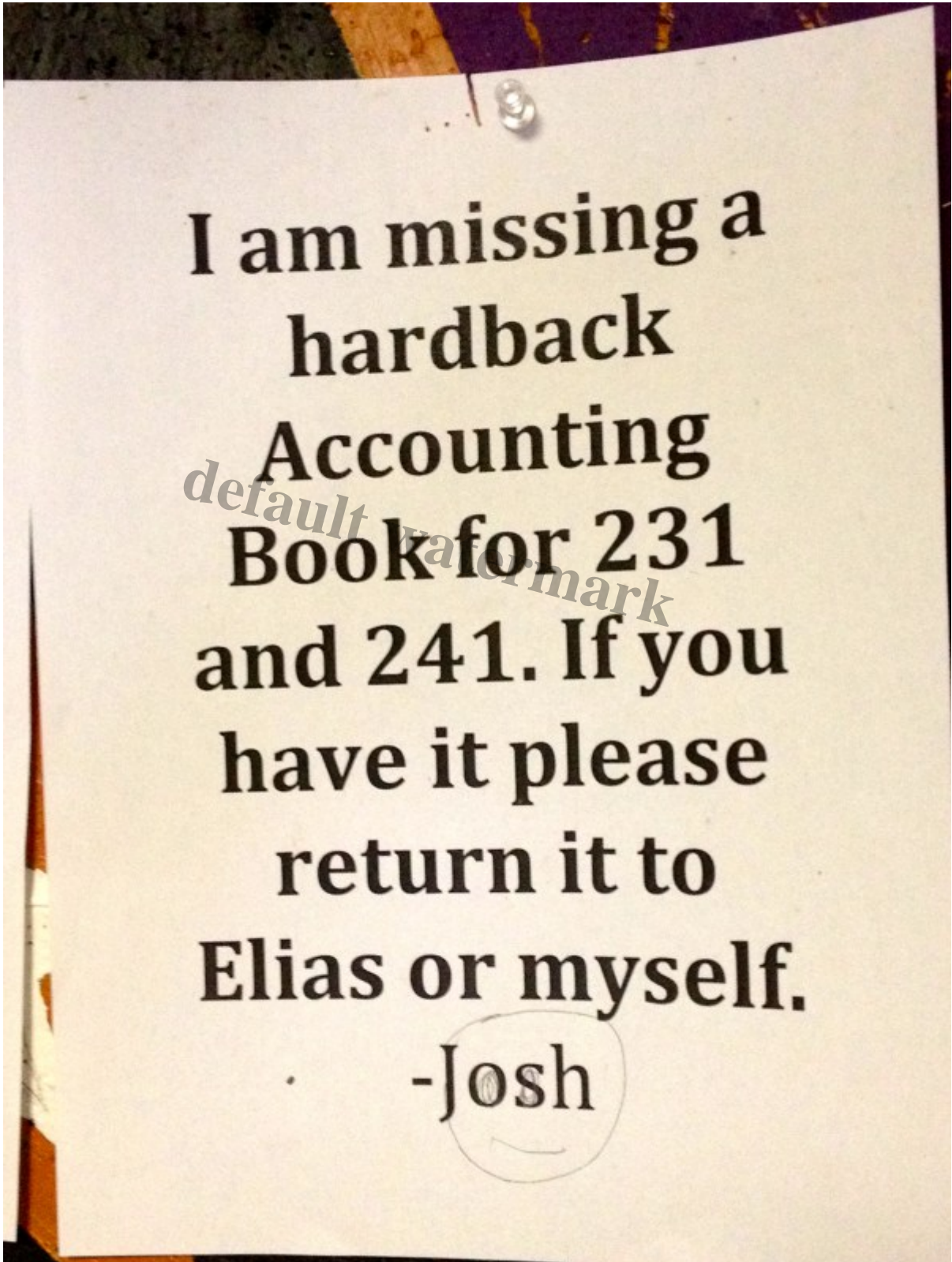
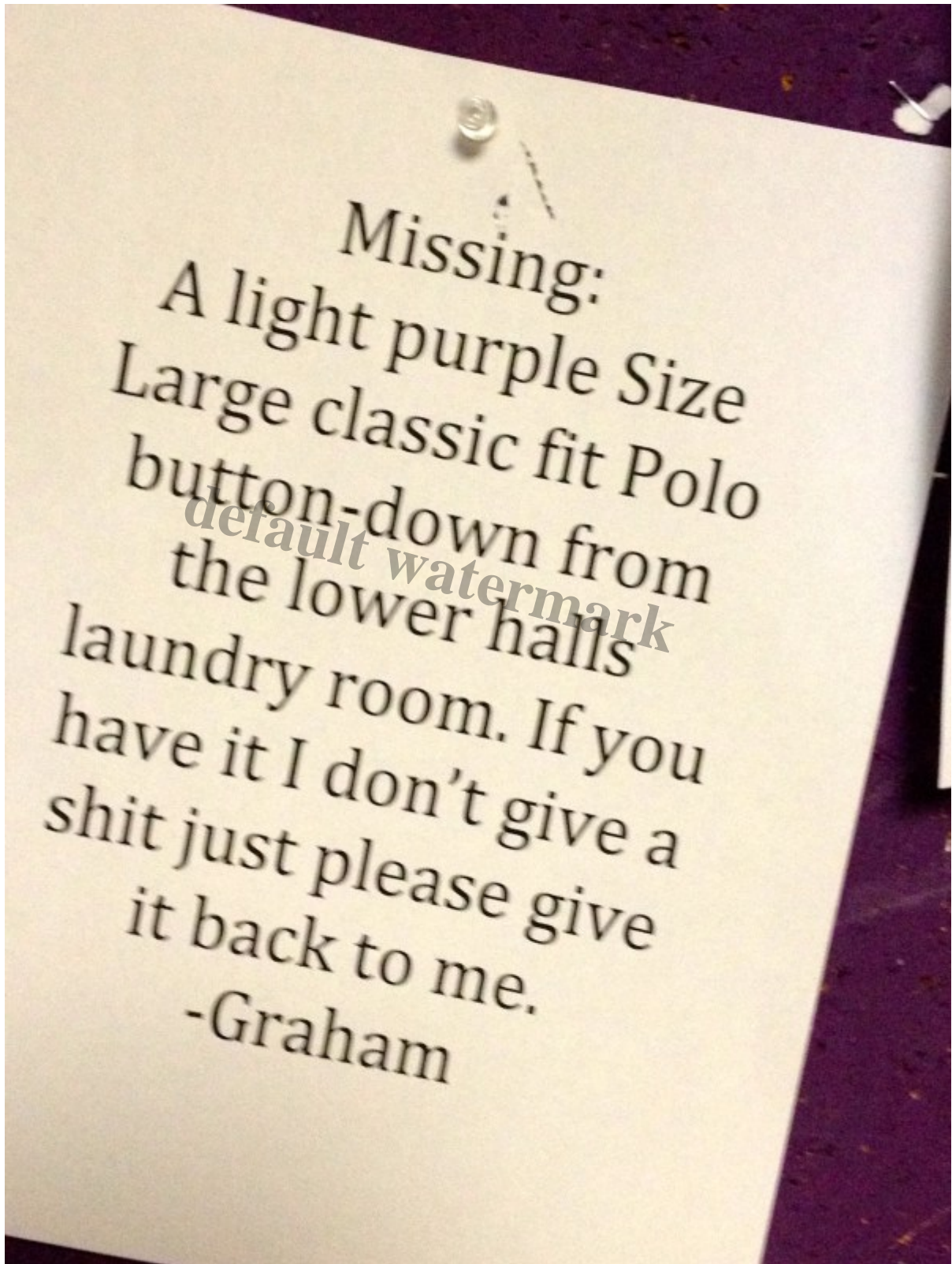


Are you missing something?
