You never know when a 45 minute commute can turn into hours. I did a google search on winter car kit essentials. According to [Popular Mechanics](#), you should already keep an [emergency kit](#) in your car which I currently do not. Some **essentials for every day and road trips** are:

1. a first-aid kit
2. jumper cables
3. gloves
4. a flashlight
5. duct tape
6. a tow strap
7. simple tools

7. windshield de-icer- I have this thanks to my friends Cindy and Bob who picked some up for me.

I would have soft hands and lips from my lotion and lip balm which I always keep in my car and kleenex for a runny nose. I also have my AAA card for roadside assistance.
